#### ADVOCACY/ DADAH ITU HARAM OUTREACH EVENT







The Dadah Itu Haram (DIH) Campaign held its outreach event on 13 Aug 2023 at Singapore Expo during Gegar Temasek, an event organised by Eventify Pte Ltd. The event was graced by Assoc Prof Muhammad Faishal Ibrahim, Minister of State, Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of National Development. The DIH volunteers joined MOS Faishal to engage members of the public to raise awareness of the campaign and remind them the importance of staying drug free. One of our volunteers, Mr Ramli Abdullah also spoke about his experience as a former drug abuser and shared on the harms of drugs.







On 21 Aug 2023, 14 new Anti-Drug Abuse Advocacy (A3) Network volunteers attended the A3 Network training session at Central Narcotics Bureau Headquarters. Through the training, they got to learn more about the drug situation in Singapore and how to help their peers stay away from drugs. An exabuser was also invited to share his experience with the volunteers on how he first started abusing drugs and his journey rebuilding his life after rehabilitation. The volunteers then discussed some possible initiatives that they could start to better spread the anti-drug message in the community. We look forward to the contributions of our new fellow advocates.

In our July edition, we shared the impact seen in Portugal after it decided to decriminalise consumption of all drugs for personal use. In this edition we look at another case study in Switzerland where drug liberalisation policies have cause a negative impact on society.

Swissinfo reported in Jul 2023 that in the western Swiss city of Geneva, the number of crack-cocaine addicts has risen rapidly causing a concern among drug prevention officials. An non-profit organisation, Addiction Switzerland has raised concerns saying that dealers from other countries such as France, Nigeria and Guinea have infiltrated the city.

The news outlet mentioned that cocaine used to be consumed in other Swiss cities such as Solothurn, Zurich and Basel whereas Geneva had been a hotspot for heroin. Now, Geneva faced a huge rise in the number of cocaine addict with one addiction shelter, Quai 9, seeing a sharp increase in the number of cocaine addicts observed, from 3,400 in 2019 to 17,000 in 2020. Unable to cope with the sudden rise of cocaine addicts, many seeking treatment were being turned away. Key takeaways from the Swiss experience are:



Decriminalisation of drugs lead to rise in addicts

Infiltration of dealers make the drug situation worse

Foreign dealers profit the most by selling inferior drugs

Treatment centres are overloaded causing those who seek help to be turned away
