


A Resilient Community for a Drug-Free Society

ADVOCACY / A3 ADVOCACY SERIES



The second instalment of the A3 Advocacy Series* took place on 18 June 2022 (Sat), 10am - 11:45am via Zoom. The session, titled 'Drug Impacts on the Mind, Body and Behaviours' covered three topics by three speakers. Firstly, 'Impact of Drugs on Us', presented by Dr Jimmy Lee (Psychiatrist, Senior Consultant & Chief @ Institute of Mental Health and NCADA** Council Member), looked at clinical health impacts of drug abuse and different types of drugs. 'Social-Behavioural Impacts of Drugs', presented by Mr S B Viknesan (Senior Counsellor @ National Addictions Management Service and NCADA Council Member), looked at the impact of drug abuse on the society, families, and youths. Finally, 'Personal Sharing by Former Drug Abuser' Mr Ramli Abdullah (Founder of Reforming Support Group and A3 Adult Advocate), highlighted the struggles and turning points of drug abuse and recovery. The closed-door session was attended by Guest-of-Honour, Associate Professor Dr Faishal Ibrahim, Minister of State Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of National Development, along with attendees from the A3 Network, partner agencies and non-profit organisations.

PDE PROGRAMME / AFTER SCHOOL ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMME

With the easing of safe management measures, physical sessions of our After-School Engagement Programme are now available again!

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q: What is the duration of the programme; and how many students can it accommodate?

A: Each session is about 1.5 hours, starting from 2pm or 3pm on weekends for 10 to 20 students. The session is conducted in the school's premises, in accordance with safe management measures. Booking is to be done minimally two weeks in advance.

Q: Do you have an online version of this programme?

A: Yes, CNB has a virtual version of the programme but certain components such as the AR exhibition will be excluded. Hence, we strongly encourage schools to book a physical session, where possible, to provide students with a more immersive experience.

Q: If I do not have 10-20 students, can I still sign up for the programme?

A: Yes, we still welcome you to sign up. For virtual sessions, CNB can match you with another school with a similar situation so that we can run a combined session. When signing up through the PDE e-service, please indicate the number of students.

Q: Are we able to mix students from different cohorts?

A: Yes, CNB can accommodate students from the different cohorts as long as it is kept at secondary level.

Q: It is indicated that the programme is recommended for secondary school students. Can I also book for primary school students?

A: The ASE programme is catered for secondary school students. However, should you think it is also useful for your primary school students, we can put together a programme comprising an anti-drug talk, video screening, static exhibition and other activities. EASED CANNABIS LAWS IN THAILAND

Thailand legalised the growing of marijuana and its consumption in food and drinks on 9 June 2022, being the first Asian country to do so with the aim of boosting its agriculture and tourism sectors. CNA reported sighting shoppers queued up at outlets to purchase cannabis-infused drinks, sweets, other consumables, and even cosmetics. As part of the loosening measures, cannabis can now also be grown and cultivated by home growers (for personal use) and local farmers (for commercial purposes). This legalisation represents an additional easing of cannabis laws in Thailand, which had already legalised medical marijuana back in 2018.

WHAT THIS MEANS FOR ANTI-DRUG ADVOCACY

As drugs become more easily accessible overseas, individuals may be faced with the temptation to abuse such substances under the pretense of exciting, new experiences. The legalisation of cannabis in a neighbouring country such as Thailand may also light a new spark on local cannabis legalisation conversations. Singapore remains staunchly against any sort of drug legalisation due to its harmful effects on individuals, families, and communities. There is substantial research which suggests that recreational cannabis is highly addictive and is associated with various physical, psychomotor, cognitive, and psychological harms. However, Singapore does have frameworks in place for the supply, prescription and dispensation of such products for medical purposes in Singapore.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Advocates can help to spread awareness to friends, family, and colleagues that despite local governing laws on drugs (cannabis or otherwise), all Singapore citizens and residents are bounded by the Misuse of Drugs Act (MDA). Based on the MDA, the consumption of controlled drugs e.g., cannabis, heroin, ecstasy, etc. in Singapore and overseas is a punishable offence of up to 10 years of imprisonment, a fine of up to \$20,000, or both. Individuals who are positively traced for drugs will be apprehended under the assumption that the substance was consumed in Singapore, even if it were abused overseas. Advocates may also consider reading CNB's infographics on the harms and myths of cannabis to share with friends and family.
