ABOUT NATIONAL COUNCIL AGAINST DRUG ABUSE (NCADA)

NCADA was formed in January 1995 as a citizen's advisory council to the Ministry of Home Affairs on preventive drug measures and programmes in Singapore. The Council advises the Government on measures and strategies to curb drug abuse in Singapore. Its role is also to harness community support for anti-drug programmes and complement the promotion of preventive drug efforts, programmes, and research to inform the public on the dangers of drug addiction.

The Council's focal areas are:

- Publicity & Communications To achieve impactful and sustained communications through the creation of awareness for the drug-free cause and the generation of shared commitment for a drug-free Singapore.
- Advocacy & Community Engagement To rally and expand support for the drug-free cause and measures through strategic partnerships and the building of advocacy and community resources.
- Research To gather evidence-based facts to refine preventive drug strategies and provide actionable insights to strengthen upstream drug prevention efforts in Singapore.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

As we conclude the 2022-2024 term, I reflect on our collective journey in championing Singapore's firm stance against drug abuse. The global drug landscape remains challenging, with the World Drug Report 2024 reporting that an estimated 292 million people abused drugs in 2022, a 20% increase from a decade ago. This alarming figure emphasises the critical importance of NCADA's ongoing work in drug prevention and education.

In an era of evolving global drug policies, NCADA strongly supports Singapore's firm and resolute zero-tolerance stance on drugs. As the advisory body to the Ministry of Home Affairs and a conduit between the government and the wider community on drug-related issues, NCADA conducts regular studies to gauge public opinion. We have observed that while no nation has managed to eradicate drugs completely, Singapore's drug situation remains stable because of the collective resolve of the community to make our home safe for our youths so that they can live to their fullest potential. This is evidenced in NCADA's National Drug Perception Survey (NPS) 2023, where more than 9 in 10 Singapore residents, both adults and youths, agreed that maintaining a drug-free environment is in the best interest of Singapore.

Throughout this term, we have made significant strides in our youth-focused initiatives, notably our collaboration with the Singapore Cybersports & Online Gaming Association (SCOGA) on their Campus Legends, an annual Inter-Tertiary Esports Tournament. Under the banner "We Game as One", this partnership effectively leveraged the gaming community to advocate for a Drug-Free generation, engaging youths through esports while also addressing parental concerns. A highlight was the Parents Seminar, graced by Associate Professor Muhammad Faishal Ibrahim, Minister of State, Minister of State Ministry of Home Affairs and Ministry of National Development, which explored youth vulnerabilities to drug abuse and strategies for early prevention. This multifaceted approach allowed us to engage both youths and parents, creating a more comprehensive anti-drug advocacy effort.

Nevertheless, we continue to grapple with emerging issues. Of particular concern is the growing tendency among certain youth to adopt more permissive attitudes towards drugs such as cannabis, often influenced by pervasive misinformation campaigns. According to the World Drug Report 2024, cannabis remains the most commonly used drug worldwide with 228 million abusers, which is 78% of the total drug abusers' population worldwide. Qualitative interviews from NCADA's National Drug Perception Survey 2023 revealed that some youths believe cannabis use can be personally regulated, while young adults in their early 30s often view it as a "soft" drug which can be tried without addiction risks. Amidst a complex information landscape on the drug issue, this highlights an urgent need for educators and parents to educate themselves about the differences in various harmful substances. Understanding the distinct harms can help our youths make informed decisions to stay drug-free and lead healthy lives.

As we embark on a new term in 2025, we shall champion and play a leading role in anti-drug advocacy efforts, starting with sparking meaningful conversations that not only educate but also resonate with individuals, parents, and communities on a personal level. Our key focus will be to work closely with and rally our stakeholders, ecosystem partners, and the community to deepen engagement with youths and parents, as well as conduct research to generate deeper and broader insights for the drug-free cause.

I extend my heartfelt gratitude to our Council Members, partners, and all supporters who have contributed to our mission. As we move forward, we are determined to build upon our achievements and address the evolving challenges in the drug landscape. Our work is far from over, but with your continued support and dedication, I am confident that we can make significant strides in our fight against drug abuse. Let us renew our commitment to this vital cause and work tirelessly towards a drug-free future for all Singaporeans.

Our children are more vulnerable to drug abuse today. What can we do as parents?

For the first time in its 6th season, Campus Legends, the premier inter-tertiary esports tournament organised by the Singapore Cybersports & Online Gaming Association (SCOGA), partnered with NCADA to spotlight the Drug-Free cause in Singapore, with the aim of rallying the gaming community towards advocacy for a drug-free generation.

Under the banner "We Game as One", the campaign built a deeper awareness of how youths can do their part in keeping their friends safe from the harms of drug abuse. Through social media posts, infographics, and personal testimonies by fellow gamers, youths were challenged to speak up against drugs, support their peers, and advocate for a drug-free lifestyle. The campaign also discussed the relevance of the drug-free cause to our generation of youths.

As part of NCADA's collaboration with Campus Legends, a Parents Seminar was held on 3 August 2024. The seminar's theme was "Our children are more vulnerable to drug abuse today. What can we do as parents?" Panelists helped to make sense of various vulnerabilities and realities faced by children today, and talked about the key stresses and how parents might help their children cope. The discussion also focused on how drug addiction affects the developing brain of adolescents and what parents can do for early prevention, such as availing themselves for open conversations with their children.

Drug Victims Remembrance Day

Starting from 2024, the Drug Victims Remembrance Day will be observed on the third Friday of May each year. The inaugural Drug Victims Observance Day, organised by the Central Narcotics Bureau (CNB) and graced by Minister for Home Affairs and Minister for Law, Mr K Shanmugam, took place on 17 May 2024 at Ngee Ann City Civic Plaza. This significant event served as a reminder of the devastating impact of drug abuse on individuals, families, and communities. NCADA was honoured to show our support for this important initiative, which aligns closely with our mission to promote a drug-free Singapore.

Both of these events provided valuable platforms for NCADA to strengthen our partnerships with other agencies in our shared mission to combat drug abuse. We will continue to work closely with CNB and other community partners in safeguarding our community's well-being and keeping Singapore drug-free.

DrugFreeSG x Young ChangeMakers 2024

Young ChangeMakers (YCM) is a youthfor-youth programme, organised by the National Youth Council (NYC), to empower youths in starting up projects that benefit the community. NYC and Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth (MCCY) collaborated with CNB for the YCM sharing session held on 28 September 2024, to prepare relevant challenge statements for interested youth participants to gather and formulate actionable ideas. NCADA Council Member Mr Firdaus Daud participated as a panellist and shared insights on two key problem statements: how to empower parents to initiate meaningful conversations about the harms of drugs with their adolescent children, and how to effectively engage youths against drug abuse while guiding them away from drugs.

How can we keep our youths safe from drugs? NCADA Council Members Dr Jimmy Lee and Mr Firdaus Daud addressed this crucial question at the Self-Help Groups' Joint Learning Fiesta on 9 November 2024. The event, held at the Singapore Institute of Management and jointly organised by the Chinese Development Assistance Council, Eurasian Association, SINDA and Yayasan MENDAKI, was attended by educators, mentors and teachers from various agencies. The sharing focused on the 3Cs (Curiosity, Culture and Coping Mechanism) explaining why youth take drugs and strategies for engaging in conversations with youths about drug abuse such as using teachable moments and wellknown news cases to highlight the harms of drugs.

Asia Golf Conference 2024

On 4 December 2024, Chairman NCADA Mr Tan Chong Huat organised the Asia Golf Convention (AGC), where one of NCADA Council Members, Mr Nicholas Gabriel Lim, participated as a panel speaker on the topic "Anti-Doping 2.0: Developing a Drug-Free Culture". Mr Lim shared insights beyond traditional concerns around doping in sports, exploring how parents and leaders in the sports community can cultivate a culture that values discernment among youths regarding substance abuse. The engagement highlighted the importance of fostering a drug-free environment that extends beyond sports, emphasising the role of parents and community leaders in shaping youth attitudes towards substance abuse and promoting a drug-free culture.

MOBILISING COMMUNITY PARTNERS: THE DRUGFREESG (DFSG) FUND

About the DFSG Fund

The DrugFreeSG (DFSG) Fund is a grant scheme administered by NCADA on behalf of the Ministry of Home Affairs. Open for applications year-round, the Fund supports community projects that promote preventive drug education and yield anti-drug advocacy outcomes. In 2024, the Fund supported four local initiatives which engaged youths and families, helping to amplify anti-drug messages among these segments and contributing to a drug-free Singapore.

DFSG Recipient: Republic Polytechnic



Organised by Republic Polytechnic, the 'Voices of Victory: Sing. Dance. Drug. Free' competition provided a platform for aspiring artists to showcase their skills, empower youth, and promote a drug-free lifestyle among participants and the broader community. The project successfully engaged 131 participants in a competition that showcased exceptional dance and vocal performances, while emphasising a drug-free lifestyle. The event's impact extended beyond the participants, reaching 894 on-site attendees and garnering significant online engagement with over 120,000 views. The competition not only nurtured emerging talents but also raised community awareness about a drug-free lifestyle and created a platform for anti-drug advocacy.

DFSG Recipient: Community Sports Network @ Teck Ghee



Through the SMASH IT! Badminton Competition 2024, Community Sports Network (a) Teck Ghee successfully tapped into the power of sports to promote anti-drug initiatives. The event engaged over 600 youths, leveraging badminton to promote a drug-free lifestyle. Through pre- and post-event publicity, on-site information booths, and feature articles, the competition effectively raised awareness about the harms of drug abuse. The project's impact extended beyond the badminton court, reaching the wider Republic Polytechnic community and transforming participants into ambassadors for a drug-free society. The project showcased how sports can be a powerful tool for sparking important conversations against drug abuse.

DFSG Recipient: Nanyang Technological University, Cultural Activities Club, Dragon & Lion Dance



The NTU Institutional Lion Dance Competition 2024, organised annually by NTU Cultural Activities Club (CAC) Dragon & Lion Dance (DLD), successfully leveraged its platform to engage youths, parents, supporters, friends, and Chinese culture enthusiasts on preventive drug education. The event, graced by Mr Gan Kim Yong, Minister for Trade and Industry and Member of Parliament for Chua Chu Kang GRC, featured a special Lion Dance performance with a tailored anti-drug message, creatively blending cultural celebration with important antidrug messaging. This year, 24 teams across different education levels participated, reaching an audience of approximately 460 attendees.
